Specific objective	1 - Support a common visa policy

Please provide a summary of the progress made in implementing the strategy and achieving the national objectives over the financial year.

The implementation of the SO1 has progressed towards achieving the objectives of the national programme. The 9 projects under 3 actions (including Specific Action) of the total value of 100% of the funds earmarked for SO1 have been supported. The 3 projects have been completed on the reporting date.

NO1. National capacity

In order to ensure national VIS software evolutions, procurement of hardware for VIS national site, upgrade, in whole or in part, technical and communication equipment of working places at 58 visa services, install and maintain point to point lines with the Embassies of the Republic of Lithuania and 4 other consular offices, increase flow of transmitted data as well, 5 projects have been carried out. The 2 projects have been completed.

NO2. Union acquis

Seeking to improve the qualitative and quantitative performance indicators of Lithuania's visa services, 2 projects have been supported. A Phase I of the project on training for consular staff have been completed. A Phase II of the same title project started.

SA1. Consular cooperation

In order to set up consular cooperation mechanisms between at least two Member States resulting in economies of scale as regards the processing of applications and the issuing of visas at consulates in accordance with the principles on cooperation laid down in the Visa Code, the MFA have continued with the implementation of a project "Broadening of representation at the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty".

With effect of the implementation of the SA1 from March, 2017 Lithuania represents Iceland for the purpose of examining visa applications and issuing short stay Schengen visas in Almaty, Kazakhstan.

For the purpose of issuing Schengen visas the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty represents Estonia (since January 2012), Finland (since May 2012), Sweden (since June 2012), Norway (since June 2015) and Iceland (since March 2017).

There were no significant issues affecting the implementation of the programme against the objectives set, taking due account of the policy dialogue held with Lithuania at the beginning of the current programming period.

Actions funded under national objective

1 - National capacity

The 2 actions (5 projects) were supported and carried out over the financial year:

• Implementation of the national VIS

Project LT/2017/PR/1111 Adapting NVIS to changes in the Visa Code completed in 2019. NVIS interface software was aligned to the changes referred to VISA CODE PLUS; NVIS software was replaced taking into account any changes to operations performed by users.

Project Development of the national VIS started in 2019 and must be completed in June 2022.

• Upgrading of technical and communication equipment of working places at visa services

Project LT/2016/PR/1121 Upgrading of technical and communications equipment of working places at visa services, Phase I, completed in 2018.

A 100% upgrade of the technical and communication equipment of the working places, which use the VIS, performed in 17 out of 51 main visa services. A 50% upgrade of the equipment performed in 34 visa services. Computer and office equipment (desktop computers (350), monitors (350), scanners (70), ink-jet and laser printers (175)) and communication equipment (UPS for the workstations of VIS (100), anti-virus software (1), portable biometric enrolment equipment (20), telephone exchanges (4), telephones (157) and equipment for VPN tunnels (2 for the MFA)) have been procured. The 4 telephone stations and their peripheral equipment upgraded at the Embassy of RL to the Russia, the Consulate General of the RL in Saint Petersburg, the Consulate General of the RL in Kaliningrad and at the Embassy of the RL in Kiev, Ukraine. The project helped the MFA to ensure efficient and uninterrupted work at visa services.

Phase II of the project started in 2020 and must be completed in June 2022.

Project LT/2018/PR/1123 *Purchase the leased line service* will be closed in 2020. Four international communications channels (leased lines) have procured: the MFA and the Embassy of the RL to the State of Israel (of 2 Mbps bandwidth); the MFA and Embassy of the RL to the USA and the United Mexican States (of 100 Mbps bandwidth); the MFA and the Permanent Delegation of the RL to NATO (of 100 Mbps bandwidth); the MFA and the Republic of India (of 10 Mbps bandwidth). The project helped the MFA to increase cyber security with the earlier mentioned four international communication channels worldwide also to ensure effective and uninterrupted internet connection between the MFA and four Embassies when there are internet censorship and difficulties with surveillance in those countries.

Actions funded under national objective 2 - Union acquis
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The following action supported and carried out over the financial year:

• Training for employees of visa services

Project LT/2016/PR/1211 Training for employees of visa services, Phase I, completed in 2018.

In the course of the project, 3 trainings for consular officers, 6 regional trainings for visa service staff, an international seminar on visa issues for representatives of Lithuania and other Schengen Member States, and 2 special trainings for preparing the staff of 2 (two) Lithuanian missions (Baku, Azerbaijan and Kaliningrad, Russia) for Schengen evaluations, were carried out. The trainings were attended by 210 employees (indicator C 2.1) from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and diplomatic missions and consular posts of the Republic of Lithuania, as well as representatives of other Schengen Member States. Duration of the trainings: 3201.35 hours.

Employees of visa services at regional training were trained on Issues of practical application of the Visa Code; Application of the simplification of the procedure for the issue of visas between the European Union and third countries; Problems related to the representation for other Schengen States when issuing Schengen visas; Communication with applicants, information of the public and the internal organisation of work.

The project improved the administrative and organisational capacity of the staff of Lithuanian visa services.

Project LT/2019/PR/1212 *Training for employees of visa services, Phase II*, must be completed in February 2022.

Actions funded under national objective	3 - Consular cooperation

No funding priorities have been planned under the national objective.

Specific action	1 - Consular cooperation
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The following action supported and carried out over the financial year:

• Broadening of representation at the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty

In accordance with a project "Broadening of representation at the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty" 1 consular officer position and 1 technical employee (filing clerk) were established and are maintained in the Consulate-General of Lithuania in Almaty, Kazakhstan, starting 2016.

The project was split into two phases depending on the length of time covered.

A project LT/2016/PR/1311 Broadening of representation at the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty, Phase *I*, have been completed in May 2019.

A project LT/2019/PR/1312 Broadening of representation at the Consulate-General of the RL in Almaty, Phase *II*, started in 2019 and will be completed in March 2022.

Specific objective	2 - Borders

The implementation of the SO2 has progressed towards achieving the objectives of the national programme. The 33 out of the 36 projects under 19 actions (including 4 Specific Actions) supported and carried out up to the date of this report. The 15 (including 1 project under the SA) out of 33 projects have been completed by the date of this report.

The total amount committed under the grand agreements constitutes 100% of the funds earmarked for NO1, NO3, NO4 (16 projects).

The total amount committed for NO6 (13 projects) constitutes 65.58% of the NO6 funds, as the grand agreements for 3 projects (Investments on the EES; development and implementation of the ETIAS; support to the quick and effective upgrading of the national components of the SIS, in line with the Regulation (EU) 2018/1861) should be signed in 2020.

• NO1: EUROSUR

Projects contribute to the setting up 5 new local coordination centres, modernisation of 1 regional and 9 local coordination centres at the border with the Russion Federation and at the border with Belarus, to a reduction in the reaction time for border control, quality of analytical reports, increasing of the NSP-level situational awareness. The 5 out of the 9 projects completed.

• NO3: Common Union Standards

Measures have to be implemented necessary to 1) automatically verify the physical and electronic protection measures of travel documents with the set-up and operation of the technical infrastructure for the connection to the ICAO PKD; 2) harmonise voice radio communication network with Poland and Latvia; 3) upgrade information system VRIS. The 2 out of the 4 projects completed.

• NO4: Union Acquis - Borders

In order to implement reccommendations made in Schengen evaluations, to improve professional competences and skills of border guards, to increase the number of officers who are comprehensively prepared to participate in operations coordinated by the EBCGA, specialised and advanced training of border guards organised. The 1 out of the 3 projects completed.

• NO6: National capacity – Borders

Within 8 actions, 16 projects is intend to ensure proper control and monitoring of the borders, taking into account the abolition of border checks at the internal border and strengthening of border checks and surveillance at the external border, to implement the EES and the ETIAS. It will be invested into modern, interoperable equipment, technical means, as well as into strengthening the technical base for the risk analysis and crime intelligence. A secure IT based platform for the management of classified information on the external border management will enable faster data transfer and dissemination of criminal intelligence information; improve border guard contribution to Europol's SOCTA. The 6 out of the 16 projects completed.

There were no significant issues affecting the implementation of the programme against the objectives set, taking due account of the policy dialogue held with Lithuania at the beginning of the programming period.

Actions funded under national objective	1 - EUROSUR

The 2 actions supported and carried out up over the financial year:

• Strengthen exchange of information among all the authorities responsible for external border surveillance by obtaining advanced electronic data processing and transmission techniques in order to maintain the National Situational Picture (NSP)

Project LT/2018/PR/2111 *To procure and modernise hardware for continuous information exchange* completed in Jan 2019. As a result, the NSP maintains with information on the status and the position of available assets, areas of operation and information on environmental conditions at the external border, all incidents related to illegal migration, cross-border crime, crisis situations as well as analytical reports, risk rating trends, regional monitoring.

• Development of national border surveillance system

Project LT/2017/PR/2121 Installation of border surveillance systems completed in Dec 2017. The border surveillance systems at the most vulnerable border sections with Belarus (*at Purvenai, Druskininkai, Tribonys, Švenčionys and Pavovere FSs,* 180.44 km) installed, **5 local coordination centres (LCC)** established.

Project LT/2016/PR/2122 Upgrading of border surveillance systems at Bardinai, Viešvilė, Lavoriškės and at Zagunis FSs completed in Oct 2019. As a result **2** LCC at the land border with the Russian (at Bardinai FS, 27.5 km; at Viešvilė FS, 30 km) and **1** LCC at the border with Belarus (at Lavoriškės FS, 22 km) modernised; The initialy planned upgrading of border surveillance system at Zagunis FS was withdrawn in order to cover a longer section of Lavoriškės FS.

Project *Upgrading of border surveillance system at Lavoriškės FS*, *Phase II* completed in Oct 2019. The previously installed border surveillance system at the border with Belarus (33 km) fully renewed.

Project LT/2018/PR/2125 *Upgrading of border surveillance system at Plaškiai FS* completed in Dec 2018. A previously installed border surveillance system (24.5 km) and **1 LCC** renewed.

2 projects *Upgrading of the maritime border monitoring system, Phase I* and *Phase II* are on-going. As a result **a regional centre** (at the Coast Guard Frontier District) and **3 maritime LCC** (at Neringa, Palanga and Kopgalis FSs) will be renewed.

2 projects Upgrading of the border surveillance system at the Vileikiai FS; at the Padvarionys FS are ongoing. The 2 LCC will be renewed.

There are no threats that the projects might remain incomplete.

Actions funded under national ob	jective	2 - Information exchange

No funding priorities were planned under this national objective.

Actions funded under national objective	3 - Common Union standards

The 3 actions (3 out of the 4 projects) supported and carried out over the financial year. The 2 out of the 3 projects completed.

• Implementation of the biometric data verification system, stage II

Project LT/2017/PR/2211 Implementation of the biometric data verification system (Phase II) completed in Nov 2018. Lithuania established SPOC infrastructure and national DV interface to fulfil the requirements of Commission decision C (2009) 7476 to have a robust communication infrastructure for regular inter-country communication covering DV certificate exchange. SPOC ensures full-fledged Extended Access Control for electronic Machine Readable Travel Documents (eMRTD) like passports, travel documents and residents permits. Competent authorities in the Member States are granted access to Lithuania's eMRTD while relevant authorities in Lithuania have access to biometric information stored in eMRTD of other Member States.

• Harmonisation of radio communication with Poland and Latvia through installation of the voice information communication networks integration equipment and 4 common (virtual) voice information exchange channels

Project on *Modernisation of the DMRCS, implementation of the radio interfaces with Poland and Latvia* will be completed in Sep 2020. Within the project the state authorities of Lithuania and Poland that are involved in border management will have a more efficient and secure way of communication.

• Upgrading of the main and the back-up centres of the information system VRIS

Project LT/2018/PR/2231 *Upgrading of the main and the back-up data centres of the VRIS, Phase I* completed in May 2019. The VRIS, based on joint information technology and telecommunications infrastructure, ensure stable data exchange among the national information systems and SIS, VIS, Foreigners Register and Interpol's database.

Project Upgrading of the main and the back-up data centres of the VRIS, Phase II started in Oct 2019 and must be completed in Sep 2022.

There are no threats that the projects might remain incomplete.

Actions funded under national objective 4 - Union acquis
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The 2 actions (3 out of the 3 projects) supported and carried out over the financial year.

• Specialised and advanced training of border guards aimed to improve professional competences and skills (2 projects)

Project LT/2016/PR/2311 Specialised and advanced training of border guards aimed to improve professional competences and skills, Phase I, completed in 2018.

The purpose of the project is to ensure the professional competences and skills of border guards and to increase the number of officers who are comprehensively prepared to participate in operations coordinated by FRONTEX.

Project LT/2019/PR/2312 on Phase II will be completed in Dec 2020. Training activities will be brought in line with the sectorial qualifications frameworks (SQF) for border guarding.

• Implementation of the recommendations made in Schengen evaluations

Project LT/2019/PR/2321 will be completed in Dec 2020. In order to implement SchEval recommendations, training of border guard officials will be provided in regard to these fields: managerial capability and communication in foreign languages related to both fulfilling of border guards daily duties and tasks and operational communication during joint operations.

There are no threats that the projects might remain incomplete.

Actions funded under national objective 5 - Future challenges

No funding priorities were planned under this national objective.

Actions funded under national objective	6 - National capacity
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The 8 actions (13 out of 16 planned projects) supported and carried out on the reporting date. The 6 out of the 13 projects completed.

• Implementation of the national SIS II

Project LT/2019/PR/2411 *Implementation of the national SIS II (NSIS)* completed in Dec 2019. The NSIS software evolutions as functionalities of the use of fingerprints in the NSIS, the transmission of biometric data to the CSIS and support of the SIRENE office operations procured.

The Phase II of the project started in Jan 2020.

• Upgrading of software and hardware

Project LT/2018/PR/2421 will be finished in April 2020. In order to ensure compatibility between systems for data exchange the SBGS will acquire hardware (236 pc) and software, fingerprint scanners (181), document scanners (181), SQL Server and Schengen Masterlist service for the document authenticity checks.

• Acquisition of technical means for border control

Project LT/2017/PR/2431 on procurement of portable thermal imaging cameras (229), night-vision devices (231) and of binoculars (200) completed in 2019.

Project LT/2018/PR/2432 on procurement of patrol vehicles (large all-terrain vehicles (72), minivans (18), 4-wheel moto-cycles with trailers (4), 2 minivans and 2 trailers for dog transportation completed in 2019.

The follow-up project (Phase II) shall be completed in Dec 2020.

Project on strengthening canine operations was divided into three phases. The Phase I of the project is completed. The Phase II finishes in May 2020. The Phase III must be completed in May 2022. Dogs, portable enclosures with kennels, protective dog handling suits, dog cage boxes and etc will be purchased. Within the project it is sought to increase the number of detected state border infringements.

Project Purchase of equipment used on a mobile surveillance system completed in Nov 2019.

• Establishment of a secure IT based platform for the management of classified information on the external border management by obtaining modern technical tools, an installed information system and a secure data transmission network

Within the operating support mechanism Lithuania is funding the maintenance and running costs of the national VIS and national SIS.

Within the project *LT/2018/OV/3111 Procurement of maintenance and repair services for the national VIS in years 2016-2018* operating support ensured comprehensive operational management and regular scheduled maintenance for all facility supporting infrastructure and assets or, simply, preventive maintenance for specific assets in the national VIS infrastructure by the 31 December 2018. The project closed in 2019.

Project *Procurement of maintenance and repair services for the national VIS in years 2019-2020* started in Jan 2020 and must be completed in Dec 2022.

Within the project *LT/2018/OB/3211 Procurement of maintenance and repair services for the national SIS in years 2016-2018* operating support include comprehensive operational management and regular scheduled maintenance for all facility supporting infrastructure and assets or, simply, preventive maintenance for specific assets in the national SIS II infrastructure. The project completed in 30 June 2019.

Project *Procurement of maintenance and repair services for the national SIS in years 2019-2020* started in Jan 2020 and must be completed in Dec 2022.

All of the said projects will hopefully be implemented successfully in due time while achieving the results provided for in the Programme.

There were no significant issues affecting the implementation of the programme against the objectives set, taking due account of the policy dialogue held with Lithuania at the beginning of the current programming period.

The 96.37% of SO5 funds have been allocated to 53 out of 55 projects up to the date of this report. The 27 projects are already completed.

It has made progress in improving Lithuanian institutional commitment to the EU policy cycle on serious and organised crime, enhancing capabilities by technical development, improving information exchange between all partners and target groups involved, implementation of anti-corruption measures, improving of operational cooperation between relevant EU and 3rd actors, both at national and international level and enhancing knowledge of the law enforcement officers.

NO1: C - prevention and combating

Seeking to implement two EMPACT operational projects, to improve capacity to prevent and combat crossborder and organised crime of 4 law enforcement authorities, to achieve at least 50% of forensic institutions' field of expertise to be accredited, to execute more effective financial investigations, strengthen interinstitutional and international cooperation combating illicit drug circulation and fight against corruption, to raise public awareness of corruption, to improve security and protection of intelligence information and its exchange, 25 projects (**100% of NO1 funds**) continued or completed.

NO2: C - exchange of information

In order to create capacities of systemised police cross-border information exchange on central and territorial levels and implement EIXM, improve national infrastructures for habitoscopical data collection and analysis concerning international organised crime, improve system of collection of comparative crime statistics, to create analytical measures based on data of the Register of Criminal Offences, to create uninterruptable receipt of Retained Data from electronic communications in public electronic communication networks, to achieve more secure and faster data exchange about electronic communications events and to exchange information within PIU and between PIUs and Europol, 9 projects (**93.52% of total NO2 funds**) continued or completed.

NO3: C - training

In order to strengthen the national training system by establishing new training facilities, which meet the requirements and standards of modern, properly equipped training institutions, upgrading of existing and development of new and more sufficient and EU based training programmes and capacity building for national police officers by linking their training and their career, 14 projects (77.57% of NO3 funds) continued or completed.

NO4: C - Victim Support

In order to protect and support witness and victims of crime by modernisation of witness and victim protection centres (including physical security equipment, computers and other related technical measures) and improve the polygraph publication and press engineering systems, 5 projects (100% of total NO4 funds) completed or continued.

There were no significant issues affecting the implementation of the programme against the objectives set taking due account of the policy dialogue.

The 4 actions (25 out of 25 projects) have made significant progress up to the date of this report. The 15 projects are closed.

• Strengthening of police capacities to prevent and combat cross-border, serious and organised crime by participation in JITs and EMPACT, obtaining information technologies, special means and technical equipment in criminal intelligence, as well as technical means and software to counter cybercrime

5 out of the 9 projects (LT/2017/PR/5113, LT/2017/PR/5111, LT/2019/PR/5117, LT/2017/PR/5115, LT/2020/PR/5119) completed up to the date of this report. The implementation of the remaining 4 projects has progressed as planned.

• Strengthening of police capacities by developing of investigative and research methods, special investigative and IT equipment, laboratory equipment, training on the use of the equipment and familiarization with new examination methods

7 out of the 10 projects (LT/2018/PR/5121, LT/2017/PR/5124, LT/2018/PR/5128, LT/2018/PR/5129, LT/2016/PR/5120, LT/2017/PR/5126, LT/2018/PR/1210) completed. The implementation of the remainding 3 projects has progressed as planned.

• Capacity building for customs divisions carrying out criminal intelligence activities and pre-trial investigations

2 out of the 2 projects (LT/2017/PR/5132; LT/2019/PR/5131) completed.

• Capacity building for effective financial investigations and fight against corruption: creation of an inclusive data management platform for automated processing, analysis, storage and exchange of

data about violations of the financial system, development of a criminal intelligence management system at the Special Investigation Service (STT), tools for the anti-corruption education

Project LT/2016/PR/5143 completed. The implementation of the remainding 3 projects has progressed as planned.

The 6 actions (9 out of 10 projects) has made significant progress.

• Development of capacities on cross-border information exchange and joint actions at the borders in accordance to the recommendations of the European Information Exchange Model (EIXM) through Installation of hardware and software necessary for the Lithuanian Police to conduct cross-border information exchange and joint actions on central and territorial levels

Project must be completed in March 2021.

• Modernisation of the Habitoscopic Data Register (HDR) and creation of working stations for the collection of HDR data through technologies of advanced personal face identification and personal search according to identification attribute, improvement of the interoperability of the HDR and other data registry systems, creation of working stations for the collection of HDR data in the territorial police units

Project LT/2018/PR/5221 on modernisation of the HDR must be completed in March 2020.

Project LT/2019/PR/5222 on creation of working stations must be completed in June 2020.

• Creation of analytical measures for the Register of Criminal Offences in order to improve the collection and the comparison of statistics at national and EU level through improvement of the system of collection of comparative crime statistics for transmission to designated European institutions and creation of the records of victims helping to develop support measures for victims

Project LT/2018/PR/5231 must be completed in May 2020.

• Creation of a centralised Information system of Retained Data from electronic communications in public electronic communication networks by obtaining specialised hardware and software that would allow law enforcement authorities of Lithuania and the EU (automatically in 24/7 mode) to receive of Retained Data from electronic communications in the public electronic communication networks.

Project LT/2017/PR/5241 completed in 2019.

• Development of existing national PIU to develop and implement a Passenger Name Recorder IT system

Project LT/2019/PR/5251 shall be completed in Dec 2020.

The follow-up project (Phase II) will start in 2021.

The trainings on topics relating the use of chemical substances and of the camouflage of technical means as well as the body language in criminal intelligence were conducted for the STT staff.

The 7 projects (LT/2017/PR/5313, LT/2016/PR/5315, LT/2016/PR/3112, LT/2017/PR/5316, LT/2017/PR/3110, LT/2016/PR/5318, LT/2019/PR/3113) have been completed.

The implementation of the 7 projects is carried out.

A remainding one (5312) out of 15 projects will start in 2020.

NO1: R - prevention and combating

In order to prevent violent extremism and terrorism more effectively, the acquisition and further upgrading of technical equipment, expertise, secure facilities, especially ICT systems and their components at the Union level, including for the purpose of European cooperation on cyber security and cyber-crime, notably the European Cybercrime Centre, **16 projects** with the total value constituting 100% of NO1 funds were supported and carried out up to the date of this report. The 9 projects have been completed.

NO2: R - Exchange of information

In order to develop a system for the monitoring, prevention or de-radicalisation of the radicalisation processes including the local community, local governance authorities and non-governmental organisations, Identify possibilities for the promotion of radicalism and extremism and the methods of recruitment for terrorist activities, and seek to suppress the activities, make use of the possibilities made available by the Anti-Radicalisation Network (RAN) as set up by the EC, and exchange of best practices of other countries, as well as to create ballistic data retaining, identification and international exchanging system and seeking to retain and automatically identify ballistic data obtained during the investigation of firearms related crimes and ballistic data exchange via the INTERPOL IBIN, **2 projects** with the total value constituting 100% of NO2 funds were finalised up to the date of this report.

NO 3: R – Training

In order to improve capabilities of police officers in investigating terrorism and other related crimes, strengthen the capability of police officers to perform criminal intelligence and criminal prosecution and expand national and international cooperation in these areas, **3 projects** with the total value constituting 100% of NO3 funds were supported and carried out up to the date of this report.

There were no significant issues affecting the implementation of the programme against the objectives set, taking due account of the policy dialogue held with Lithuania at the beginning of the current programming period.

• Capacity building for the fight against terrorism perpetrated by individuals and prevention of violent attacks at national and EU level by obtaining equipment for the detection of cyber-attacks and other cyber-crimes, data collection, recording and expeditious preservation, as well as the data processing and analysis, equipment for responding to terrorist attacks (CBRN equipment, special utility vehicle, etc.), forensic laboratory equipment for carrying out examinations of explosive materials, firearms, ammunition and improvised devices specified in the programme has been funded.

The following 9 projects have been completed up to the date of this report:

LT//2017/PR/6111: Two off-road (4WD) minivans acquired. The LPAOR are able to arrive to the site of an incident quickly under difficult access conditions and to carry out special antiterrorist, hostage rescue and dangerous criminals' catching operations.

LT/2018/PR/6112: A special-purpose armoured storming vehicle with the hydraulically lifted platform and Class 4 ballistic protection shields acquired.

LT/2018/PR/6113: Snipers of unit ARAS were equipped with special-purpose field clothing for snipersobservers (10 sets), devices (a spotting scope, a multifunctional laser DME and a tactical tripod) and equipment (10 sets).

LT/2018/PR/6115: Special-purpose computer-aided X-ray machines (2 pc.), compressed-air breathing apparatuses (SCBA, 5 sets) acquired.

LT/2017/PR/1110: Laboratory equipment for IT investigations, portable investigation equipment, hardware for a training classroom acquired.

LT/2017/PR/1113: An *a*utomated monitoring of internet resources and automated submission of reports by detected keywords are secured.

LT/2017/PR/1115: One set of vehicle control equipment which would be integrated into the unified vehicle control system procured.

LT/2018/PR/6118: Acquisition of laboratory equipment for the examinations of explosives and other, Phase I. A modern laboratory equipment for the analyses of explosives, fire arms, ammunition and improvised devices procured.

LT/2019/PR/1116: Building the capacities of Anti-Terrorist Operations Unit ARAS, Phase III. A RIB-type boat with special equipment and a trailer for boat towing purchased.

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transmitted by electronic means. The network is accessible to the Central Criminal Police Unit and the Police Headquarters of all counties.

• Preparing to an automated information exchange through the INTERPOL Ballistic Information Network (IBIN) through the installation of an integrated ballistic identification system (IBIS) that would allow the law enforcement authorities of Lithuania to retain and automatically identify ballistic data obtained during the investigation of firearms related crimes and ballistic data exchange via the INTERPOL IBIN

Project LT/2017/PR/6221 *Preparation for carrying out automated data exchange through the Interpol Ballistic Information Network (IBIN)* completed in December 2018. The Lithuanian Police Forensic Science Centre is ready for exchanging ballistic data via IBIN. The actual results in comparison to the targets set in the programme have been achieved.

Certificates were awarded to 500 officers and to 56 trainers. The actual results in comparison to the targets set in the programme have been achieved.

Project LT/2019/PR/6312 Specialised training for criminal intelligence officers, Phase II. In order to improve the capacities of specialised criminal police officers in investigating terrorism and other related crimes, 53 officers working in the specialised criminal police units of the Lithuanian Criminal Police Bureau and the county police headquarters improved their knowledge during 5-day trainings on 'Open Source Online Intelligence Gathering and Secret Internet Investigations'.

Project LT/2016/PR/6313 Awareness-raising training in terms of investigation terrorism and extremism. In order to protect the public and its most important values from terrorism threats and dangerous consequences, 23 employees of forensic police units, who perform ballistic investigations, investigations of explosion circumstances, dactyloscopic, polygraph, information technology and image investigations, improved their qualifications in specialized courses, practical and theoretical seminars and symposia in other Member States.

The 96.71% of STS funds have been allocated to 66 projects (out of 70) and to foregone visa fees up to the date of this report. The 39 projects have been completed.

• NO1: Upgrading of FTD/FRTD issuing and delivery systems

In order to ensure smooth and continuous operation of the IT system of FRTD, to upgrade communications equipment for the IT of FRTD as well as hardware and office equipment for the issuance of FRTDs and FTDs, to improve working and living conditions of the staff serving the FTD/FRTD system in Russia and to ensure safe and reliable transfer of the STS personnel and to maintain around-the-clock communication between all officials involved in the STS, 13 out of the 14 projects with the total value constituting **91.34% of NO1 funds** were completed or carried out.

• NO2: Ensuring and development of the control over the persons traveling with FTD/FRTD

In order to upgrade portable devices for document checks in transit trains, hardware and software for border checks of FRTD/FTD travellers, to develop information systems for controlling persons travelling with the FTD/FRTD, to install Wi-Fi network at the Kybartai railway BCP, to maintain a secure database on the transit passengers and to ensure proper digital mobile radio communication along the Kena–Kybartai railway, 7 out of the 8 projects (**87.51% of NO2 funds**) were completed or carried out.

In order to replace the roof-mounted equipment on trains, to upgrade hardware and software for monitoring transit trains, to develop video surveillance system along the Kena–Kybartai railway and to upgrade video surveillance systems at Kybartai BCP and Kena BCP, 4 projects (100% of NO3 funds) were completed or carried out.

• NO4: Improving the reaction capability of patrol units for the smooth functioning of transit by Russian citizens

In order to improve the reaction capability of patrol units for the smooth functioning of the STS by replacement of vehicles and procurement of four unmanned aerial vehicles, upgrading of helicopters equipment, procurement of technical means for apprehension of illegal immigrants, strengthening of dog handling units, procurement of the Signal Receiving and Processing Systems ensuring the efficient control of persons traveling through Lithuania, construction of hangars and renovation of garages for 22 parking places, as well as introduction of vehicle licence plate recognition system at borders, 13 out of the 15 projects (**88.98% of NO4 funds**) were completed or had made significant progress.

6.2 Common monitoring and evaluation framework (Article 14(2)(f) of Regulation (EU) No 514/2014)

Monitoring and evaluation measures taken by the Responsible Authority, including data collection arrangements, evaluation activities, difficulties encountered and steps taken to resolve them.

Responsible authority (RA) as well as delegated authority (DA) have monitored the ISF common indicators and programme specific indicators as well as other project results. According to project agreements, every project has an ISF programme indicator (if applicable) that is planned to achieve and project performance indicators. In accordance with a pre-agreed payment application submission schedule, project promoter submits payment applications to a delegated authority and reports on the project performance indicators set in a project agreement as well as ISF common indicators and programme specific indicators (if applicable). Indicators and their achievement are monitored through the ISF information system (VORAS).

DA verifies payment applications while analysing project performance indicators provided in the payment application for the reporting period as well as ISF common indicator and programme specific indicator (if applicable). DA monitors the level of achievement of project performance indicators and ISF programme indicator (if applicable) while also considering indicator values provided in a project agreement. If the desired level of an ISF programme indicator and/or project performance indicator provided in a project agreement is not achieved, the delegated authority assesses the reasonableness of funding for such project, and can propose to reduce the funding to this project in accordance with the ISF programme's project administration and financing rules. There were no such problems in the 2019 financial year. Project providers implemented projects consistently and smoothly, so it is expected that in accordance with the submitted project provider's payment applications, all the planned project performance indicators and ISF programme indicators will be achieved at the end of the project's implementation.

Ensuring an overall monitoring system, on-the-spot controls are also carried out and can be organised by either RA or DA. In the 2019 financial year, both RA and DA organised project inspections and on-the-spot controls. On-the-spot control revealed that project provider ensure good progress of projects and control their implementation, provide orderly documentation and its storage.

ISF programme monitoring revealed good cooperation between the RA and DA and maintenance of direct control over the implemented projects. Following the beginning of the programme's implementation in the year 2019, the RA and DA discussed the implementation progress of ISF programme projects, the absorption of funds, problems encountered and possible solutions.

The role of the ISF Monitoring Committee is very important in the monitoring process as it oversees all reports that are submitted to the European Commission, i.e. before its submission to the European Commission the annual balance payment application and annual implementation report for the year 2019 went through the coordination process.

Difficulties encountered and steps taken to resolve them.

The efforts to create an information system VORAS for monitoring of the Programme administration purposes was important step forward, however, the possibilities to use VORAS monitoring data for evaluation purposes need to be further developed.

Having revealed noticeable shortcomings of monitoring system VORAS, it is necessary to ensure 1) calibrating information held in VORAS with information entered into SFC 2014, 2) accumulation of Common indicators values from different projects.

There are procedures established aimed to ensure that the results of the Fund are going to be achieved at reasonable cost. Namely, the DA is assessing the prices indicated in the budgets of projects applications. Together with project application the project promoter has to provide some evidence of market prices, and then has only limited possibilities to deviate from the approved amount. Strict rules on the project budget affecting the frequent amendments of the signed grand agreements.

Beside this, promotional items compliant with the awareness rising requirements of the ISF (calendars, work books, pens, souvenirs and etc.) were procured and distributed in 2019.

The specific requirements and measures of information and visibility were laid down in the ISF Visibility Guidelines. Final beneficiaries are responsible for informing on co-financing of the project activities from the Fund. The delegated authority was responsible for the supervision of the observance of the guidelines and conduct on-the-spot checks for that purpose at least once during the project (usually before the final payment). The components of the image of the Fund (logo, image plan, etc.) were applied consistently.

The ISF logo was displayed on all publications, guidelines and training materials financed from the ISF.
